Highlights of April 24th, 1991, Meeting

The April meeting of the OVTC was held on Wednesday evening, April 24th, at the Woodvale/Manordale Community Centre in Nepean. A good turn out with approximately 26 of our members in attendance.

Canadian Classic Update

The main item of business was a progress report on the 6th Canadian Classic. Malcolm Brown reported on his meeting with Glen Donaldson (TTC President) that occurred after the Ancaster British Car Flea Market on April 21st. Jeff Threader and Brian Mills also were present for this meeting. There will be a poster prepared for the Classic with TTC's help and this can be used to help promote the event. TTC's next Ragtop issue will devote an article or two on the Classic and, in this regard, OVTC should prepare a progress report on planning for the Classic that can be submitted to the Ragtop's Editor before May 22nd--the deadline for publication submission in order to meet the printing deadline for the next issue of Ragtop. Registration brochures for the Classic will be sent to the Boots 'n Bonnet Club in Kingston for distribution purposes.

Brian has tentatively set up three categories for the Concourse Judging event. First Class is the Formal Concourse categories, the Second Class is a Participant's Choice Award, and the Third Class is a Soon-to-be-Great Award. Brian needs a minimum of three teams of judges, preferably five teams for the Concourse event. Award plaques will be provided by TTC. The Concourse event will begin at 6:30 a.m. and the assembly point will be at the Rockcliffe Airport. After the Panoramic photograph, the group will head to Victoria Island for the Concourse judging.

Jeff Threader gave an update on obtaining local sponsors and advertising assistance which sounds like this is starting to fall into place nicely.

John Carr updated the Club on the Tour de Gatineau and the Fun Rally which is also coming together as one of the primier attractions for the Classic.

Terry Dale has lined up his associates with the Motorsport Club in Ontario to prepare a Driving Skills event, complete with pylons, etc. A location has yet to be determined and one or two volunteers to help Terry would be appreciated--call Terry at 224-6913 during the day.

Malcolm mentioned that Stebro Mufflers is back in business and has offered to donate a stainless steel exhaust system as a door prize (\$500 value, at least) for the Banquet event.

Hugh Henderson, our newest member from Perth, is a professional photographer, when he isn't tinkering with his '69 TR-6. Hugh has offered to do the Panoramic Photo for the Classic and more details on this and other Classic events will follow in upcoming Newsletters.

Driveline

. It is purported that the British drink warm beer because Lucas, the Knight of Endless Darkness, builds their refrigerators. Now, I really can't attest to the truthfulness of that statement. However, I do believe that Lucas assisted in the development of the Lada. Categorically, I can say I have yet to see a Lada lately with both tail lights working.

My first encounter with Lucas electrics was the installation of a Model T horn on a 1950 Morris Minor. The second encounter was the addition of driving lights on a 1960 TR3. My third encounter began innocently as a see and purchase venture. The car was listed for sale in the Toronto Star and was advertised as a 1964 Plus 4, 4 seater, in immaculate condition. I promptly set up an appointment to buy it. In those days, I had resplution, money, and

no wife.

The next afternoon, (Saturday), found me on a short side street of Avenue Road just north of Bloor, listening to a rather nervous individual extolling the virtues of his car. A look under the hood, or rather, "bonnet", and under the dash disclosed the reason for the owner's agitation. The car was a mess of loose wires. I asked the gentleman if the name of his mechanic was "Joseph E." I could see Joe's unmistakable hand everywhere. (I once had an electrical professor who believed that anyone who twisted wires indiscriminately was sexually depraved). This owner was frustrated. He had started out to correct possibly some small perceived or imaginary problem, and due to his efforts, his car was totally - completely - electrically dead. He had certainly twisted more than one wire.

One should not aimlessly meander through automotive electrics without, firstly an appropriate wiring diagram, secondly an electrical circuit tester, and thirdly some electrical knowledge. At this point, let me provide some fundamentals. The most important electrical safety device in a car is a fuse,

and the most common cause of electrical problems is corrosion.

Fuses, in a car, have the same function as in an electrical panel in a house. That is, the fuses protect electrical circuitry against overload and possible fire. Appliance or equipment/component failure can be critical but an electrical fire is final. I've experienced both, and both could have been avoided. Unfortunately, then I did not fully respect the role or function of fuses. Even years later on first getting into the Healy, you could still smell burnt fabric and overheated electrical wire insulation.

Electrical failures can be attributed to many different factors; for example, poor electrical design, excessive vehicle vibration, old age, owner "over-zealousness" (sounds better than "stupidity") and corrosion. I have no intention to conduct a discourse on failures, but rather offer a few suggestions to ensure continuing good health of the electrical system.

These simple guidelines are basic truisms. All of them make sense. Let's look at the suggestions and their impact.

1-Ensure all electrical connections are clean and corrosion-free. Most important are the battery terminals and grounding connections.

The car won't start because the battery is weak: or the head lights are dim because the generator is not functioning properly. It is possible that, in fact, these two assumptions are correct. It is also possible that somewhere there are dirty corroded connections causing power loss. And don't forget a dirty corroded connection imposes a high electrical resistance load at that point. And this resistance load always results in heat build-up. And we all know heat can cause a fire.

2- Ensure all individual grounding connections are corrosion-free.

The battery is new and all terminals are tight and clean, but the starter seems tired. The starter no longer has the old "drive". Is it time to replace the starter? Maybe "yes" or maybe "no". Before replacing the starter, it should be confirmed that the actual, physical point between the starter and the bell housing is clean, and rust and oil free. This point is the ground connection.

3- Properly sized, (not physically, but rather current rating), replacement fuses must always be used.

Everyone understands the need to properly size fuses. I hope!

4- In-line fuses must always be used to protect the electrical circuitry and the newly installed electrical device.

In-line fuses will protect the newly installed electrical device, but the electrical connection supply point must be carefully chosen. Personally, I always connect to the power supply side of the starter solenoid if a fused gang block connection is not available. I do not recommend connecting into existing circuits or switches. This practise could cause circuit failure or worse; fire! One must remember that switches and devices are only sized for existing services.

I have always found it challenging to enhance or modify a vehicle's electrical system. Not so long ago, a passing FWD tank truck brought back memories of many hours spent pleasantly designing that vehicle's air and electrical system. In a future article, I will ramble on about electrical and mechanical modifications that can be easily and simply added to a vehicle that will thwart a hot wire artist.

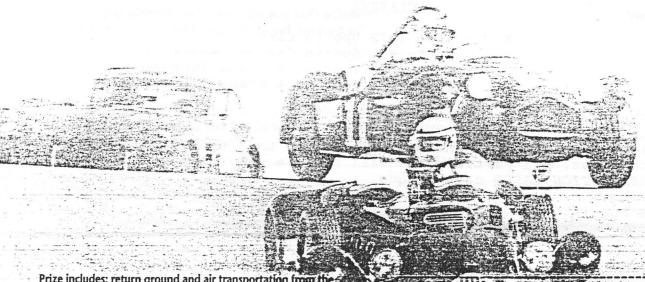

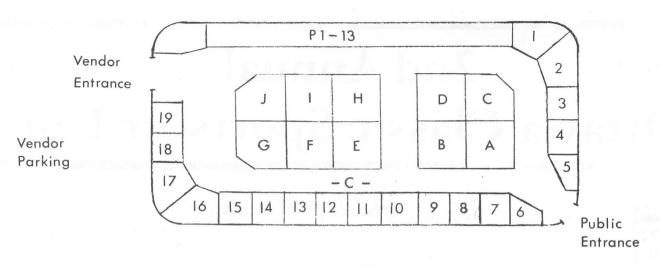
