Merrickville Show, Winery Visit and BBQ

The sun shone brightly as we made our way to Merrickville for their 10th annual car show on Sunday, July 11. Our little group of four Triumphs and a Corvette joined up with two other Triumphs who had selected a nice shady spot under a very big tree across the grass from the MGs, a perfect spot to enjoy lunch on a day that would become extremely hot. We were soon joined by another Triumph and everyone went off to look at the many cars filling every nook and cranny of Merrickville along the Rideau Canal, up Main Street and into the fair grounds.

After lunch we left Merrickville following the Rideau Canal then turning south ward to go through Actons Corners, Swans Crossing, past Oxford Mills to Hutchins



Corners, East Oxford and to Oxford Station. After a right and a quick left we arrived in Van Allens at the Green Gable Winery. The owner came striding out from the house to greet us. He introduced himself, admired the cars spread out ready for a Le Mans start and proceeded to tell us all about being a vintner in this climate. He explained what type of grapes they grow, where they were developed, the labour intensive pruning that must be done each spring, the picking, the pressing, the bottling. The group had many questions and he answered each and everyone before it was time to go inside to enjoy a little tasting. Inside the owner's wife explained that they produce three white wines and three red wines. Each was available for tasting.

Their feature wine is solely made from the Frontenac grapes handpicked from the vineyard and only lightly filtered, a very European style of wine. Additional wines are made from Sabrevois, Delisle, Louise Swenson, Cabernet Sauvignon, Reisling and Chardonney.

After a stroll in the vineyard and an explanation as to how each individual grape plant must be hand pruned in the early spring we left the winery and made our way to the outskirts of Kemptville where the British flag was flying atop the flag pole on our daughter's front lawn. Many thanks to Stephanie and John Rathier who hosted a BBQ, it was a wonderful ending to a great driving event.



2nd Annual OVTC BBQ – August 28

Saturday, August 28 is the date of the OVTC 2nd Annual BBQ hosted by Tim and Sue Dyer at their farm near Smith's Falls.

The plan is to meet at 1 p.m. at the corner of River Road and Regional Road 8 in Manotick – the vacant parking lot across from Tim Horton's, behind the Drummond's Gas Bar or for those of you in the know – out in front of where the strip joint once was. We will then drive as a group to Burritt's Rapids where we will meet Tim who will lead us to the farm location arriving about 2:45 with dinner set for 5 p.m.

Bring your favourite chair to sit on and your favourite beverage to sip on. This year we are asking each car/family to bring some snacks, a salad or dessert to share. Please keep in mind that there is no kitchen facility or refrigeration at the site. The club will sponsor the meat, buns, ice and soft drinks. Tim assures that there will be more shade this year as he has chosen to use a different area of the farm with a large shade tree. The privy has been cleaned and is ready to use.

If you are planning to attend please RSVP to both Tim and Pat. We need to know how much food to buy and who to expect for the run.

For those of you who wish to make your own way here are the directions.

1. Go south via Manotick on either side of the river.
2. Go west on Roger Stevens Road (highway 6), through North Gower.
3. Go past Malakoff Road.
4. Several kms later, at a flashing yellow light (if it's still working!--unreliable) turn left onto Dwyer Hill Road.
5. Follow Dwyer Hill Road south until it ends at the stop sign (you're now at Burritt's Rapids).
6. Turn left, then immediately right and go through the village of Burritt's Rapids and over the Rideau.
7. Turn right at the stop sign, where the road ends.
8. The river will be on your right. Eventually, the road will merge with highway 43, at a stop sign.
9. Turn right onto highway 43 and follow it into Merrickville.
10. At the stop sign in Merrickville, turn right.
11. Go across the river and turn left at the stop sign, continuing on
43. BEWARE: 4-way intersection but 3- way stop. Road from the left has priority!
12. Drive 9.8kms and turn left at Kilmarnock, onto Kilmarnock Road.
13. Follow Kilmarnock Road (bearing right at Wollford Chapel) until it dead-ends at Hwy 17.
14. Turn right onto Hwy 17.
15. Take the second left, onto Kitley Line 1 (there is an Alpaca Farm on the right and a big sign with an old bicycle on it, on the left).
16. Go slowly over the railway tracks.
17. We are on the left, next to the driveway for the second house on the left. There will be a sign outside.

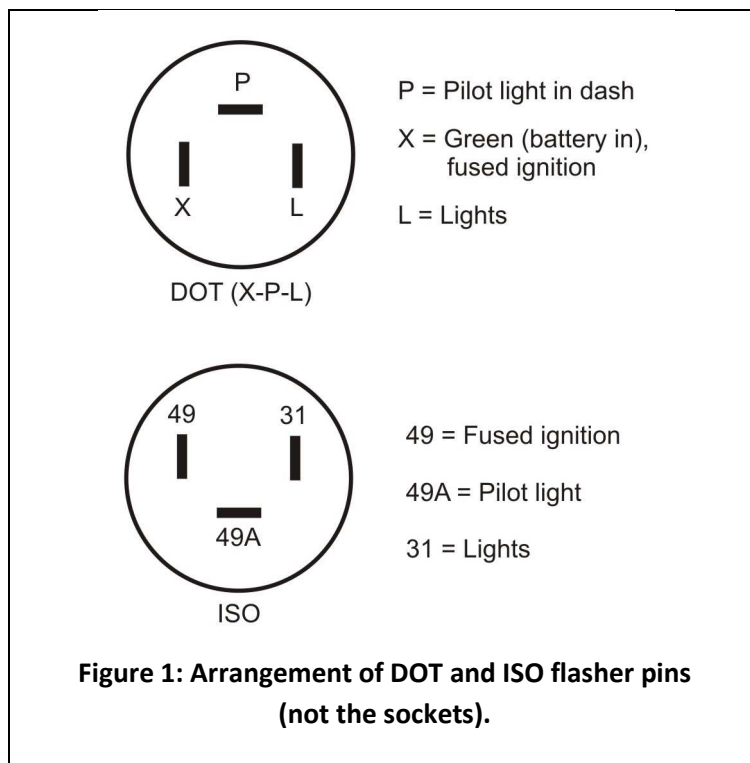


Three-Terminal Signal Flashers

Recently, I decided to replace the flasher on my TR4A. My car takes a 3-pin flasher, and these are readily available at a number of auto parts suppliers. Pretty simple and straight forward you say. Not really!

I found that there are two pin-out variations based to two different standards — DOT (the older standard, also called X-P-L because that is how the pins are labelled) and ISO (International Standards Organization), which is the newer European-based standard (see Figure 1).



These two flashers are identical in size and fit and they sit side by side on the shelf. The Tridon parts EP35 and EP36 are ISO standard; whereas, EP34 is DOT. To make matters more confusing they use the exact same packaging.

Performance

The entry-level is a basic flasher, such as the Tridon 550, that costs about \$5.00 (CTC Part 20-1036-2, DOT, 3 pin). This flasher will drive 4 lights and has a life of about 36 hours. These basic flashers are thermal-based and are fine for pre-electronic vehicles. They are just fine for our old cars. However, other options are available.

The next step up is an electro-mechanical flasher that has a much longer life and can accommodate greater loads. Such flashers include Tridon HD13 and

its older version EC13. These are also DOT 3-pin, but have a life of about 400 hours and can handle up to 10 lights. CTC also stocks these flashers (CTC Part 20-1030-4, about \$8.00).

Finally, there are fully “electronic” flashers such as EP 34 (CTC Part 20-1034-6, DOT, 3 pin), which has a life of about 600 hours and costs about \$14.00.

All of these flashers will work well in our cars, but the trick is that you must be sure that you buy a DOT (X-P-L) flasher. The easiest way to identify this flasher is the labelling of the pins; often the packaging does not stipulate the standard used.

As an aside, a 2-pin flasher LOUD flasher is also available, which might be useful for those of us that are getting a little hard of hearing. Although this will not work in my TR4A, it may well work in a TR6, at least some of which have 2-pin flashers. This flasher is available from CTC (Part 20-1040-2) and NAPA (LF 12) for between \$15.00-17.00. I have not been able to find a 3-pin version.

Beet and Barley Salad

Several of the ladies at the Dyer's Winter Bash asked for this recipe.

8 small beets.....cook, peel and dice
 ¼ cup red wine vinegar
 3 cloves garlic, minced or crushed.....or more
 1 tbsp Dijon mustard
 ¼ tsp salt
 ¼ tsp pepper
 ½ cup olive oil
 1 cup pearl barley
 ½ cup dry white wine
 2 ½ cups chicken or vegetable stock
 ½ lb feta cheese.....crumbled
 ¼ cup toasted walnuts

Dressing

Whisk together vinegar, garlic, mustard, salt, pepper and 2 tbsps olive oil.
 Add ¼ cup to warm beets....then let the beets sit to room temperature.

Take the remainder of the olive oil, heat and toast the barley in it for a few minutes. Add wine and cook 1 minute. Sir in stock and bring to a boil. Lower heat and simmer covered for 40 to 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Not all the liquid will be absorbed.

Remove from heat and let stand uncovered for 10 minutes. Put in a bowl, fluff with fork, then add dressing, toss and let barley sit until room temperature.

Mound the barley on serving dish and cover with beets feta cheese and nuts.

This makes a large salad, which will easily serve 8 people. It refrigerates well and can be served the next day, cold.

A Visit From the TR Register in Australia

A few years ago, I was about to fit wider wire wheels with more spokes for safety reasons. I could not establish a definitive recommendation for tyre size for these wheels from any sidescreen TR owner in North America, nor in the UK. As a result, I registered on the Australian club's forum and asked the question. I was immediately welcomed and given exactly the concise information I had been trying to get for several months.



At a later stage, something else confused me during a repair on our car, so again I posted a question on the Australian club's forum. The response was again concise, knowledgeable and speedy.

Shortly thereafter, one of the responses was from Neil. He'd looked up where we live and determined it isn't far from some friends that he and Cathy have known for many years. Neil asked, despite it being a long-shot, if we happened to know these friends who live in Carleton Place. As it turns out, we do know them through the local Horticultural Society, so an additional connection had been established.

E-mail banter ensued and then Neil conveyed that he and Cathy would be in our area in June and, as luck would have it, during the period when the June OVTC meeting was taking place. Neil and Cathy were staying with our mutual friends in Carleton

It’s “British Invasion” time again!!! There will be a “British Invasion” of the Hazeldean Cruise Night, similar to previous years, this year on August 24th, combined with a gathering at the local dining spot afterwards. The Hazeldean Cruise Night organizers have again agreed to extend their hospitality to us and to provide us with the space for our “British Invasion”. This show raises money towards CHEO from some of its activities but there is no entry fee.

You (and the members of all the other British Car Clubs in Ottawa) are invited to come and join us to show your car in the “British Invasion” zone any time after 5:30 pm on Tuesday, August 24th, at Hazeldean Shopping Center on Eagleson Road, just south of Robertson Road/Hazeldean Road and about 2 km south of the 417 exit on to Eagleson/March Road. We will lock or move the cars to the new Don Cherry’s at the show site at about 7:30 and go dine. This restaurant donates 10% of our bill to the Cruise Night charity.

Over 3 of the last 4 years we have had a great turn out – up to 55 cars. Last year we were rained out but joined a later show –this year, if we are rained out we will do the same.
