OVTC Winter Bash - January 21

The Ottawa Valley Triumph Club's Winter Bash takes place at the home of Tim and Sue Dyer. This is a BYOB potluck supper for all club members and their families. You are invited to arrive anytime after 2 p.m. Supper will be served at 5 p.m. Bring your equipment if you like to cross-country ski or snow shoe. There are trails everywhere. They'll have the ping pong table set up and if anyone wants a tour of the tree and perennial nurseries and greenhouses, Sue and Tim would be happy to oblige. When you get to the house, just come into the house through the garage, and then upstairs to the main floor.

You will find the directions to a great party with wonderful food below or the location can also be found on Google maps by entering "Beckwith, 427 Kings Creek Road, Ontario, Canada" or on MapQuest by entering "427 Kings Creek Road, Beckwith, ON, Canada".

From Ottawa, take the 417 Left exit onto the 416, before Kanata. Exit the 416 at the Fallowfield Road

exit (second exit).

Turn right at the end of the exit. Go straight at the first light (Moodie). Turn left at the next light, onto Richmond Road.

Follow this to the town of Richmond and go straight at the light, crossing Eagleson Road (Drummond's gas on the right corner, Richmond Nursery on the left. You're now on Perth Street in Richmond).

Go straight through the town of Richmond, do not turn.

After Richmond, continue to follow what has become highway 10 for about 13kms.

At the 4-way stop (Dwyer Hill Road), go straight. (Landmark: JTF2 antiterrorist base on the right corner Go 3kms and turn left onto Ashton Station Road. This is just as you enter the village of Prospect (note you will first see an Ashton Station Road to the right. Ignore it). Take the first right (it's after about 2kms), onto Kings Creek Road.

We are number 427, about 2kms on the left.



If you are coming from Smith Falls or Carleton Place take Highway #15 to Franktown, turn east on Richmond Road (Hwy 10)), travel 5kms and turn right onto Brunton Side Road (Derry Side Road is to the left. Turn left at Kings Creek Road. Watch for #427 on your right.

The show was quite spectacular and lives up to it's billing as the largest All British Car show in N.A. One could pretty much find every year and colour of Triumph, MG, Jag, Lotus, Sunbeam, Healey, Aston, Rolls, Bentley, TVR, Mini, etc. made. I was surprised to only see one Allard. Perhaps they had an event elsewhere or hadn't made it back from the Glen yet, where there are usually a lot of them. My cousin Greg had fallen in love with MGB's while we were at Watkin's Glen the week before and this show gave him a good education on all the differences between years. I guess that since the original design of the DeLorean was re-engineered by Collin Chapman and they were ultimately built in Ireland, they were allowed in to the show. As it turned out they managed to attract 22 of them. Apparently the largest gathering in one place ever.

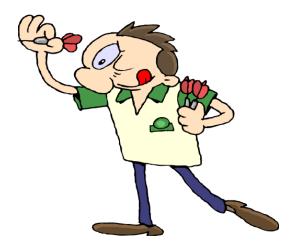

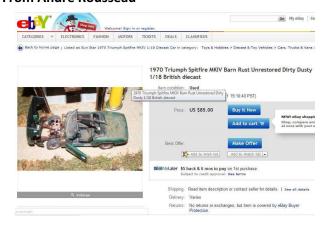

Chappell Challenge Rally - Sept. 24, 2011

Saturday, September 24 dawned overcast and threatening, but we decided to go for it as we had memories of a great time two years ago at a Jaguar Club Rally when Don LeBlanc, his wife Janet, Brian and I had tied for second place. The Jaguar people were not amused...... In 2009 Marcus Chappell a member of the Ottawa Jaguar Club and a long time successful National & International Car rallyist had organized and planned the rally. It was so successful that he then planned another for the following year. In the meantime unfortunately Marcus Chappell died and the rally was never run. This year a group of his friends decided it was time to run the Chappell Challenge Rally in his memory.

Gathered at the start in Carleton Place were 18 cars from the following Ottawa based clubs: Jaguar 7, BMW 3, Mercedes Benz 3, MGB 3, Triumph 1 (where was everyone?) Mini 1. At registration a decision had to be made as to whether one wanted to enter the Question & Answer element where one follows the route given in Tulip Diagrams and answers the questions or the Time Speed Distance element where one had to maintain set speeds or times attempting to arrive at various Check Points at times calculated on the basis of the Average Speeds and Elapsed Times shown in the route instructions and answer the questions. We chose the later – bring on the challenge.......

At the drivers meeting we were instructed to set our watches with the official clock on the registration table. Brian went to set his watch and the hands refused to cooperate – one broken watch. My watch was also an analog watch – not easy to set to the tenth of a minute with the official clock. Note to self – buy a digital clock to use in the next rally. We were also told the rally actually started as you turned west onto highway 7 off McNeely Ave. Knowing that, Brian estimated it was a tenth of a mile to the beginning of the rally and set our trip odometer at 999.9 miles. We were given the instruction booklet 5 minutes before we were to be off. An odometer check was incorporated in the first 6.8 miles. That's when we realized our trip odometer wasn't working. The tenth of a mile went round and round, but the mile numerals refused to move. Regardless we had little trouble until in Section B we were asked at mile 8.2 to give the name on the sign to our right. With our broken trip odometer we were not sure exactly where 8.2 mi. was. There were two signs very close together. According to the results we chose the wrong one......





As we headed up into the Lanark Highlands we encountered a scotch mist requiring at times the use of the windshield wipers. Suddenly the driver side wiper decided to part from the car and fell on the hood. Brian managed to pull over and retrieve it and on we went with only one functioning wiper. At the 8 minute pit stop Brian noticed the rubber blade on our one remaining wiper was split and torn. He quickly exchanged the torn blade with the better one now behind the front seat and on we went through Mississippi Station and Snow Road Station. Somewhere around Elphin or McDonald's Corners we no longer needed the wiper, but now the wiper motor would not shut off. Then it took on a mind of its own, it stopped, then took a swipe, then stopped again. As we drove out of the Lanark Highlands and down into Perth the scotch mist dried up and we no longer had to worry about windshield wipers.

With the help of a computer the results were quickly tabulated and are now posted on the Jaguar website at www.ottawajaguar.ca. Peter Whitworth of the OVTC was navigating for Lee Harrington in his Jaguar. They accepted second place for the Time, Speed & Distance element. Brian and I came in a respectable fifth. I wonder what we would have done if we had had a digital clock and working trip odometer or even God forbid a GPS.............

At the start of the rally, through the middle as we drove over a bridge and around a corner and at the end the same three people were seen always taking pictures. It turned out to be Hagen Hohn and his associates of 2H Photography. Last winter Hagen was a guest speaker at one of our meetings. At his website www.2Hphotography.ca our car is featured in four of the 9 pictures taken during the rally. While the rally revolves around cars and driving, it's the friends and new people we get to meet that make the event the success that it is. I'd like to thank the many people who were involved in organizing this fun filled event. Brian and I look forward to the next.
