


An additional function of this vehicle would be that it could carry the OVTC tent and that would allow us to have a meeting area for OVTC members.

Stowe '94


The club will provide a magnetic sign for all Triumphs attending the British Invasion 1994. The sign will be similar in shape to the rally plates seen in



Europe and will have the OVTC and British Invasion logos, the club name, and the motto "The Invasion Continues..." These signs will be black, red and white and will be approximately 8"x6". Printed on magnetic material they can be applied to any metallic part of the car without harming the finish. These signs will be an ideal way of identifying club cars at the event and of maintaining our traditionally high level of exposure.
